Fate and Enumeration Problems of Fecal Coliform Bacteria in Runoff Waters from Terrestrial Ecosystems Oct 10 2021 Field and greenhouse model tests were conducted, using both natural wastewater or tracer fecal coliform bacteria as overland flow system inocula. Enumeration problems of *E. coli* were less severe during the cool weather because of great reductions in interfering bacteria on test plates at this time. Field and greenhouse observations indicated that the continuously treated plots provided better conditions for protozoan predation of fecal bacteria and also for the development of a surface organic layer on the plots that aided in the removal of wastewater bacteria through filtration and entrapment.
