In the New Literatures in English, nature has long been a paramount issue: the environmental devastation caused by colonialism has left its legacy, with particularly disastrous consequences for the most vulnerable parts of the world. At the same time, social and cultural transformations have altered representations of nature in postcolonial cultures and literatures. It is this shift of emphasis towards the ecological that is addressed by this volume. A fast-expanding field, ecocriticism covers a wide range of theories and areas of interest, particularly the relationship between literature and other 'texts' and the environment. Rather than adopting a rigid agenda, the interpretations presented involve ecocritical perspectives that can be applied most fruitfully to literary and non-literary text. Some are more general, 'holistic' approaches: literature and other cultural forms are a 'living organism', part of an intellectual ecosystem, implemented and sustained by the interactions between the natural world, both human and non-human, and its cultural representations. 'Nature' itself is a new interpretative category in line with other paradigms such as race, class, gender, and identity. A wide range of genres are covered, from novels or films in which nature features as the main topic or 'protagonist' to those with an ecocritical agenda, as in dystopian literature. Other concerns are: nature as a cultural construct; 'gendered' natures; and the city/country dichotomy. The texts treated challenge traditional Western dualisms (human/animal, man/nature, woman/man). While such global phenomena as media ('old' or 'new'), tourism, and catastrophes permeate many

of these texts, there is also a dual focus on nature as the inexplicable, elusive 'Other' and the need for human agency and global responsibility. Laurenz Volkmann is Professor of EFL Teaching at Friedrich Schiller University, Jena, where Nancy Grimm and Katrin Thomson also teach. Ines Detmers is a lecturer in English literature at the Technical University of Chemnitz. A poem of eight parts, Stephen Sandy's *Surface Impressions* offers a stunning burst of invention, capacious enough for its grand themes of ecology, religion, and mortality, yet intimate and flexible in its constantly vibrant voice. The narrator moves through a widening landscape from New England to the cosmos itself, ruminating on the relation between his obsolescent, Romantic love of nature and the emptying of the cup of wildness in our time. American writers such as Melville, Poe, and Thoreau form a backdrop to the narrator's thoughts of his children growing up in a world of technological change foreign to their father—"this global shopping spree we're getting to be." In addition, he considers faith as it pertains to religious belief in three generations: his own, his father's, and his children's. Employing a rich verbal texture with a precision of imagery, *Surface Impressions* mirrors its narrator's tumbling consciousness as it gathers into verse the now and the long ago, the near and the far, the real and the simulated: "My screen saver shows a tropic sea, / jellyfish flouncing, sea horse trotting"; "out the window above the screen / growls no virtual deep but Melville's ocean, / the whale's path, sea of origin, of return." At once impudent and elegiac, ironic and dignified, the voice that carries readers through this brilliant poem moves freely between the antipodes of mind and universe—from the narrator's back porch to "the cluster of galaxies my galaxy is sitting in"—observing, "How cliché / to acknowledge being infinitesimal in / a system that, in its own way, is infinitesimal! /

Can't do it; nor can you." Sandy triumphs in showing the significance, fragility, and unity of all life on earth. Woodstock, a young American hippie, beats the Draft and hits the hippy trail in a coming of age story. "Wanderer" follows Woodstock's year-long journey to scratch his nomadic itch. He finds answers to his questions about fossils by studying the anatomy of otters and porpoises and examining whale embryos under the microscope. In the book's final chapter, Thewissen argues for approaching whale evolution with the most powerful tools we have and for combining all the fields of science in pursuit of knowledge. Reading level and audience Oslo is a chapter book written in deceptively simple language so that older primary school children should have no difficulty reading alone, while younger children from about 7 up can enjoy it at their own pace or reading together with an adult. While the book is accessible to younger age groups, middle grade readers will engage more with some of the themes and the multi-layered humour includes elements that grown-ups, particularly parents and teachers, will identify with. Oslo is a boy whale, but the book is aimed neither specifically at boys nor at girls. The abstract underwater setting in a school for whales makes it possible for the characters to simply be themselves. There are no hairstyles. There are no clothes. The whales are whales. Themes The approachable language helps young readers

explore topics like fairness, selfishness and the fragility of happiness. The themes are discussed through the experience of the young whale protagonist, his schoolfriends, his teachers and his dad. The characters are united by their fallibility and an honest realisation that things tend to be rather complicated when you think about them. Being different and disability One central theme is the fact that our young whale's tail looks a bit like a wellington boot. The reader accompanies Oslo on his journey from his initial realisation that this is different to understanding the wider consequences and working out how this disability impacts his self-esteem and the development of his identity. And in a final twist, *Red Leviathan* reveals how the Soviet public began turning against their own country's whaling industry, working in parallel with Western environmental organizations like Greenpeace to help end industrial
